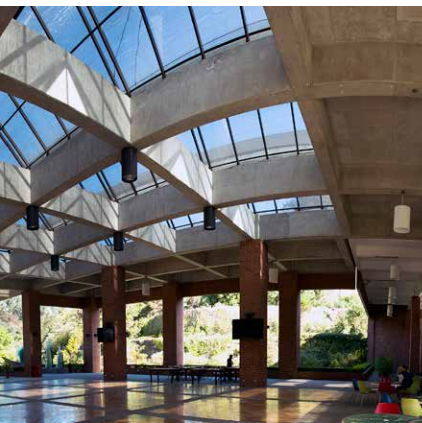

MIT GSW History

The MIT Global Startup Workshop (MIT GSW) was founded in 1997 when the MIT \$50K (now \$100K) Entrepreneurship Competition received numerous queries from around the world from organizations interested in starting and improving their own business plan competitions (BPCs). The first MIT GSW was held in Cambridge, Massachusetts, in March 1998 and brought together an international community committed to launching BPCs to stimulate and nurture entrepreneurship worldwide.

A decade later in 2007, having helped grow and mature the BPC community, the MIT GSW expanded its mission to include all aspects of the entrepreneurial ecosystem. Today it continues to build stronger, more productive entrepreneurial ecosystems around the world and a diverse and dynamic global support network for entrepreneurs.



The MIT Global Startup Workshop is the world's premier workshop dedicated to fostering entrepreneurship, inspiring future innovators, and building entrepreneurial ecosystems globally. We bring together over 300 people from different backgrounds, bridging boundaries across sectors to stimulate discussion, generate ideas, and share best entrepreneurial practices. Since 1998, our non-profit, student-run organization has held 17 international workshops, spanning 6 continents, and has attracted participants from over 70 nations. This year, we are proud to partner with Universidad Francisco Marroquín (UFM) to bring the MIT Global Startup Workshop to Guatemala City, a cultural and economic capital of Central America.

Magatte Wade

Founder and CEO, Tiossano

Born in Senegal, educated in Germany and France, and launched her entrepreneurial career in the San Francisco Bay Area, where she co-founded Adina World Beverages after working closely with Silicon Valley startups. She is a TED Global Africa Fellow and is starting a new company, Tiossano, a contemporary lifestyle products brand that integrates the cultures of the three cities that shaped her life: Dakar, Paris, and San Francisco. She is fluent in, and conducts business in, Wolof, the predominant indigenous language of Senegal, French, and English.



Martin Roscheisen

Tech CEO

Started four tech companies since 1998, three of which with products still in use and growing today 15 years later and one which —just like Bitcoin today— was technologically most intriguing but left a \$600MM hole in the sands of not just Sand Hill. He holds a PhD from Stanford University in Computer Science. His MIT GSW 2015 keynote is titled 'How to Create a Unicorn'.



Ketan Makwana

Entrepreneur, Investor, Mentor

Renowned international speaker and serial entrepreneur who has started, scaled and sold multiple businesses. In a response to the emerging skills gap between education to employment and enterprise Ketan launched Enterprise Lab in 2011 which is now operating in 11 countries training 100,000 people a year. In 2012 Ketan founded and delivered Youth Enterprise Live backed by the Prime Minister and the UK's largest event focused on Education, Employment and Enterprise. Ketan is the Head of Operations at Rockstar Startup & Rockstar Hubs and sits on many advisory boards and panels.



Slava Rubin

Co-founder and CEO, Indiegogo

Indiegogo is a company dedicated to revolutionize the way that people fund what matters to them. Under his leadership, Indiegogo has become the largest crowdfunding platform in the world. Slava is responsible for executing the company's strategic growth initiatives, while overseeing all daily operations of the business. Prior to Indiegogo, Slava was a strategy consultant working on behalf of clients such as MasterCard and FedEx for over a decade. Slava is also the founder of Music Against Myeloma, an annual charity event that raises funds and awareness for cancer research. Slava graduated with a BSE from the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania.

Tim Draper (via Skype) *Founding Partner, Draper Associates*

Tim Draper founded the venture capital firms Draper Associates and Draper Fisher Jurvetson (DFJ). His venture successes include Skype, Hotmail, Tesla, Baidu, Theranos, Overture, Twitch.TV, YeePay, Indiegogo, Docusign, Parametric Technology, and AngelList.

Tim is the creator of viral marketing, a method for spreading a software application from customer to customer instrumental to the success of Hotmail, Skype, Gmail, Yahoo!mail, and hundreds of other enterprises. He founded the DFJ/Draper Network, a global network of venture funds. In 2011 he created Draper University of Heroes, a residential and online school based in San Mateo, California, to help extraordinary people accomplish their life missions. He was ranked number forty-six on the list of outstanding Harvard alumni, number seven on the Forbes Midas List, the number one Most Networked Venture Capitalist by Always On, and number ninety-eight on the 2014 Worth magazine 100 Most Powerful People in Finance. Tim has a bachelor of science in electrical engineering from Stanford University and an MBA from Harvard Business School.



Matías de Tezanos *Entrepreneur, Investor*

Guatemalan serial Internet entrepreneur. In 2001, he founded the most visited Internet hotel reservation site in Spanish, Hoteles.com, which he sold at age 22 to Expedia. He was the co-founder and CEO of ClickDiario.com Network, an Internet advertising network in Latin America, which he sold at age 26 to FOX Networks. In 2006, he founded PeopleFund, a private equity company that invests in tech-stratups. In 2007, he started Healthcare.com, an online pay-per-click healthcare vertical, serving 4 million healthcare-related searches every month. He is also an angel investor in several Internet ventures, including StartupsNetwork.com and Wamba.com.



Luis von Ahn (via Skype) *Entrepreneur, Professor*

Guatemalan entrepreneur and an associate professor in the Computer Science Department at Carnegie Mellon University. He is known as one of the pioneers of crowdsourcing. He is the founder of the company reCAPTCHA, which was sold to Google in 2009, and the co-founder and CEO of Duolingo, a popular language-learning platform. Named One of World's Top Young Innovators by Technology Review Magazine.

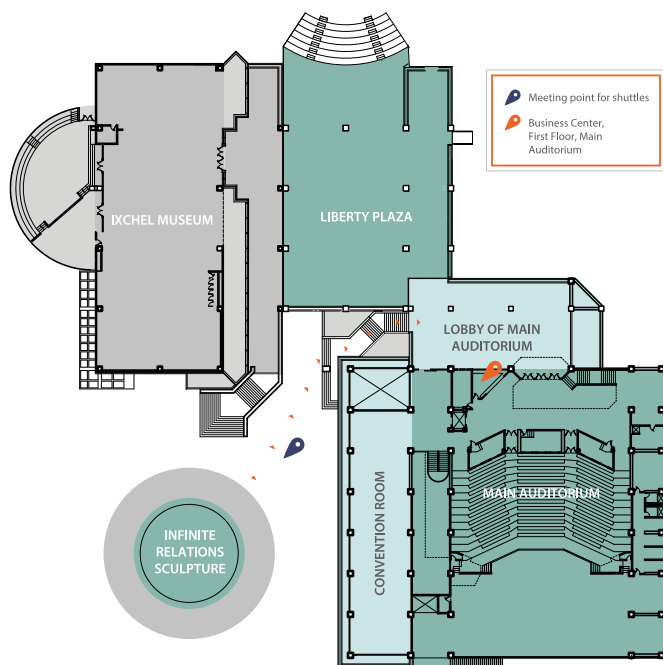

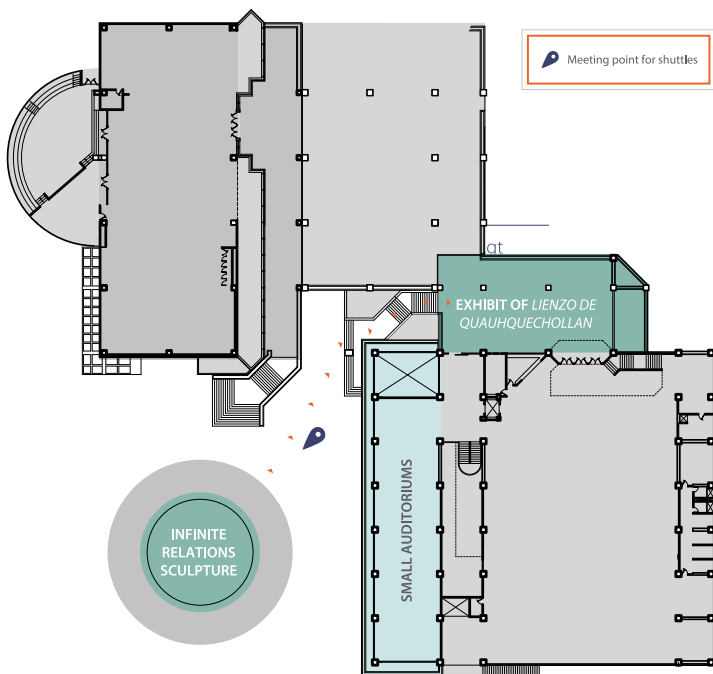

Guatemala Travel

Guatemala City is the capital of Guatemala and the most populous city in Central America. It is divided into twenty-two zones.

Areas of Interest

ZONE 1

The historic heart of the city, sights include the Museos de Guatemala, the Centro Histórico, the Paseo de la Sexta Avenida, the National Palace of Culture, the Metropolitan Cathedral, the Mercado Central (central market), the Biblioteca Nacional (national library), the Teatro Abril, the Centro Cultural Miguel Ángel Asturias, and the Hogar Rafael Ayau Orthodox Orphanage.

ZONE 16

Zone 16 is home to Paseo Cayalá, a gorgeous modern shopping and entertainment district. Featuring over sixty acres of bars, restaurants, and shops, this complex was built between two large ecological reserves, which provide a beautiful natural backdrop to this unique landmark.

ZONE 10

The city's financial center, zone 10 also houses high-end art, shopping, entertainment, and culinary culture. Of particular note is the Zona Viva entertainment district. Zone 10 is one of the most popular tourist destinations in the city and home to UFM and the 2015 MIT GSW conference.

Ground Transportation

The days of the event, transportation will be provided in the morning from the Westin Camino Real Hotel (which is connected to the Biltmore Hotel) to the UFM campus. Transportation will also be provided from UFM's campus back to the hotel at the end of each day.

If you are staying at a hotel other than the ones indicated and want to use the provided transportation, you must be in the lobby of the Westin Camino Real Hotel at the scheduled pick-up time.

Other Useful Information

Currency

Guatemala's currency is the quetzal (Q). The current exchange rate (may vary) is

Q7.60 / USD1.00

Q10.00 / EUR1.00

Most restaurants and shops accept US dollars; however, the exchange rate may not be favorable.

Traveler's checks are accepted but may be difficult to use in some places. If you bring cash in dollars, make sure the bills are in good condition otherwise they may be rejected.

Credit cards

VISA is widely accepted. Most establishments also accept MasterCard and American Express.

Airport

La Aurora International Airport in Guatemala City is approximately a twenty-minute drive from Universidad Francisco Marroquín, the Westin Camino Real Hotel, and the Biltmore Hotel.

Electricity

Guatemala runs on a 110V/60Hz system (the same as the US). North American style outlets are common in the country, however in many cases they are of the 2-pin, non-polarized design (type A) instead of the three prong, grounded design common in the US (type B). Please be sure to plan ahead and bring the appropriate adapters.

Weather

March is summertime in Guatemala City with daytime temperatures between 75°F and 85°F (25°C and 30°C).

Internet and WiFi

Both the Westin Camino Real and Biltmore hotels have WiFi available. UFM also has WiFi throughout the campus.

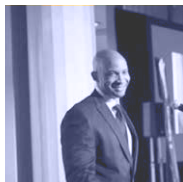

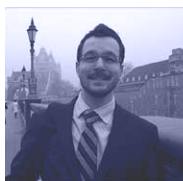

NEW AT MIT GSW 2015



The unconference is an activity that takes place on Thursday, March 26. It is an opportunity for participants competing with their pitches, business plans or for panelists to work at different stations. It is an open format where participants build up on each other's ideas, generating solutions and prototypes. The interaction through clarifying questions helps unwrap the problem or identify the opportunity, and keeps moving as far as the owner of the station would like to go.
